
JUST RIGHT BOOKS

RFADING

Our current unit is about animals. We studied how animals are adapted to various climates. Soon, we will be learning about animal habitats and life cycles.

We also read fables and thought about the life lessons or morals that they teach us. It was challenging for many students to think beyond the text to determine what the author was trying to teach through the story. We'll be circling back to this topic, but in the meantime, if you have a chance, read some classic and modern fables with your student and have them think about the lesson or moral of the story.

I hope the Math News that I have been sending home has been helpful. All Math News will be posted on my teacher page on the Madison Elementary website for your reference.


Hundreds	Tens	Ones
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Our current unit is about place value and counting to 1,000. I launched the topic by dumping out 1,000+ plastic straws on the rug. I had students estimate how many straws they thought there were. Their guesses ranged from 105 to 1 billion! Students then counted the straws into bundles of 10. Next, we counted by tens to make groups of 100. Finally, we counted by hundreds to get to 1,000. Though 1,000 seemed like a really big number, we were able to count to 1,000 quickly using tens and hundreds. We have learned all the different ways to write a number, using pictures, words, number bonds, and number sentences. We are now applying our place value knowledge to working with money.



SCIENCE

In preparation for the Monarch Butterfly Tour field trip, we have been studying insects. We learned the characteristics of insects - what all insects have and extra parts that some have. Students then chose an insect to research and did scientific illustrations of their insect and created a fact sheet to go along with it. This gave us an opportunity to talk about the difference between cartoon drawings and realistic drawings. It is my hope that, after studying insects and learning about all the ways in which they are amazing,



students will have a greater appreciation for insects and not run away from or want to kill them when they see them in the world.

We are launching our first Science Unit this month using FOSS Kits. The focus will be on observing the life cycle of mealworms. See the attached letter for more details.



HOLLDAYS

We celebrated Halloween by learning about the history of Halloween treats and using color theory to make creepy self-portraits. We also wrote adjective poems about a variety of different pumpkins. Then, we learned about Día de los Muertos, or Day of the Dead. This led to much rich sharing about loved ones who have died

and how we can remember and celebrate them. We also visited the altar in the Library.
