Strategy Name: Thumb Report

Thumb Report is a method for whole class checking for understanding* that relies on student self-reporting of understanding.

What it looks like

- I. Teacher pauses during instruction and asks students to think about their understanding of a specific topic.
- 2. Students are given a clear 3 point rubric. The specific prompts are given each time, and made with reference to the specific topic.
 - a. Thumbs up = understood well enough to instruct others

 Sample student language: "You understand it well enough to teach someone else"
 - b. Thumbs to the side = understood well enough to proceed
 Sample student language: "You understand it well enough to go on, but not
 to explain it clearly"
 - c. Thumbs down = not understood well enough to proceed
 Sample student language: "You need clearer instruction before we go on"
- 3. Students hold up one hand to show their level of understanding.
- 4. Teacher assesses student understanding based on the thumb report.

Essential elements:

- © Whole class response (not asking an individual or group)
- © 3 point rubric: well enough to teach, well enough to go on, and not well enough to go on
- © Teacher uses the information to make an immediate instructional decision

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Possible times/ways to use it:

- √ To assess whether instruction is moving too quickly
- ✓ To assess a particular step in a multi-step problem
- ✓ Use to assess understanding of directions (not just understanding of a topic)

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Possible times/ways not to use it:

- ✗ To ask about understanding of too much/too broad of material
- When the topic is a must-know (teacher may want to see proof that they know it)

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^{*}checking for understanding should be considered a formative assessment. It is a way for the teacher to determine what clarifications or re-teaching are necessary.
